### REFLECTIONS FROM PASTOR AMY JO

This spring, I preached on the well-known passage from Ecclesiastes: "For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3:1). During that sermon, I spoke about each of the seasons, with special attention to winter, the season of rest and renewal. In our very busy lives, it is easy to forget about the necessary seasons of rest that are needed for all of us, but the Bible teaches us about the importance of this. "Keeping the sabbath" is even included in the ten commandments!

The Minnesota Annual Conference encourages their pastors to take an extended renewal leave every four years, and this summer I will be on leave for six weeks for a time of rest and renewal, from July 20-August 30. I thank all of the people of Saint Paul's UMC who are taking on additional leadership responsibilities in my absence. Our congregation is blessed by your leadership. Many of you have already recorded prayers to be part of video worship, and others will provide in-person leadership for our worship services along with the guest pastors who will be preaching and providing pastoral care for the congregation. Thank you for your leadership.

It is my hope to spend some time with the things that have often brought me renewal during my life: prayer, music, art, reading, exercise, time in nature, and time with family. The retreat center to which I was first planning to travel is full through September.



(Now that I know very early reservations are required, I will plan on visiting Holden Village in an upcoming year.) However, I am delighted to be traveling to a Methodist-founded summer gathering at Bay View, Michigan instead. Bay View is a gathering on the shore of Lake Michigan that includes worship, religion-and-life lecture series, classical music instruction and concerts, book clubs, and some fun yoga and art classes. The music and prayer time will be very renewing to my heart and soul, and

the lecture series will be renewing to my mind. There will also be ample time for enjoying kayaking, running, and hiking. There is a historic United Methodist Native American congregation that worships nearby, and I hope to be able to join in prayer there as well. The Seattle area will be another destination for a shorter part of my leave, where I will be meeting my family for family time enjoying nature and contemplative prayer with the Sisters of Saint Joseph. During my time at home, I have plans with Pastor Jenny (who has been our neighbor at Christ UMC in Maplewood), to play cello and piano together. Throughout my leave, I will continue to pray for the people and the mission of Saint Paul's UMC.

Sabbath truly is a gift from God, and I encourage you to make a regular practice of keeping the sabbath as a time of rest and renewal for your spiritual health. When I return to Saint Paul's UMC in the fall, I know that it will be with fresh energy for mission, because God's Spirit will have given me the gift of renewal! May God's life-giving Spirit grant renewal to us all.

Sharon displayed and talked about religious icons she is in the process of completing or has completed. An icon is a sacred image used in religious devotion. The most common subjects include Christ, Mary, saints and angels. Iconography is symbolic art, especially that of the late medieval and Renaissance periods. Icons are painted on wooden panels, typically made of linden or pine wood. The production is a long and complex process. A layer of linen cloth soaked in special glue is put on the panel. The iconographer uses pencil and paper to create a preliminary sketch. Using graphite paper, she then transfers the drawing onto a prepared wooden board. The painting is very detailed and involves many art mediums. The traditional medium for iconography is egg tempera. Sharon's icons involved many, many hours of hard work. These icons are labors of love for her and were a joy to view.

### FINANCE UPDATE AS OF 5/31/2022

I'm sitting at my computer, awaiting Support of our inspiration for this newsletter article. An email comes in and I'm easily distracted so away I go. The email brings the sad news of the death of Dr. Lowell A. Gess who has died at the beautiful age of 100. I now have more opportunity to delay writing my article as I ponder the Christian life of such an amazing individual.

> Christian, "Christ-like." We look to many sources of inspiration as we strive to live our lives in a Christ-like manner. And the opportunity to interact with an individual such as Dr. Gess is one of the great inspirations I've encountered.

> Dr. Gess knew, at the age of eleven, that he was called to do medical missionary work. He served as a missionary in both Nigeria and Sierra Leone. In Sierra Leone he realized that the country did not have a single ophthalmologist. He went back to medical school and completed his second residency, this time in ophthalmology. Dr. Gess and his family went back to Sierra Leone multiple times to serve the ophthalmology

needs of the residents. Even after retiring from missionary work, Dr. Gess and his wife Ruth returned to Sierra Leone regularly and ultimately founded the Lowell and Ruth Gess United Methodist Hospital in Freetown. Our congregation has frequently provided financial support for the work of the clinic.

Together we celebrate 100 years of an amazing, Christ-like life, which serves as an inspiration to all of us. God bless Dr. Gess and all the work he has done in his years of service.

### MN UMC ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

Minnesota Annual Conference 2022 May 24-25 After hearing about proceedings at South Dakota Annual Conference for much of my life from my father, who was a United Methodist pastor and from two of my brothers, who followed in his footsteps, I was pleased to represent our congregation at the Minnesota Annual Conference in May. The Annual conference is an annual gathering of United Methodist lay delegates and pastors and activities center around a number of inspirational messages, amazing performances by musical groups, as well as handling any sort of church business that includes legislation. The gathering also includes various associated groups, including mission groups, that provide information to the pastors and lay delegates on their programs. I would just like to let everyone in our congregation know that the sermons delivered, the music performed, and the level of discussion in the legislative proceedings were of the highest quality. Bishop Bard did a wonderful job of overseeing the legislative proceedings where all speakers on both sides of issues were heard, were respected, but also held to a three minute time limit. Likewise, the delegates speaking to different issues were often passionate but also respectful of the process. In particular, when two of our Minnesota United Methodist churches elected to leave our Conference, the pastors from those congregations still attended and thanked the rest of the Conference for the respectful manner and conditions upon which they were able to leave.

Although it was sad to learn of those leaving, it was also good to learn that the Embrace Church, a United Methodist Church in Woodbury that is an offshoot of the Sioux Falls church with the same name and which has services tailored for younger generations, has now achieved financial independence. There were also a number of other new church starts.

Regarding legislation, I would like to mention one issue on which I voted in the affirmative. The Conference voted to change the conference's part-time racial justice organizer position into a full-time, director-level position. For anyone who manages a business or non-profit and has to manage employees, that person knows how sensitive discussions around race can be. As our own church goes forward in a changing Mendota Heights community, this new position may provide us with a resource that we can use to help us grow.

I left the conference inspired and also happy that even in these tough times, our United Methodist Church is able to conduct itself in a manner that is both inspired by God and respectful of all of its members as well as the traditions that have guided our church since the days of John Wesley.
