

"There's a song in the air! There's a star in the sky! There's a mother's deep prayer and a baby's low cry!"

Music adds so much to our lives. It helps us express feelings we may otherwise have difficulty expressing. Charles Wesley is known for composing thousands of songs, but singing was important to John Wesley, as well. Here are (some of) John Wesley's Directions For Singing, From *John Wesley's Select Hymns*, 1761:

- 1. "Sing all. See that you join with the congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a slight degree of weakness or weariness hinder you. If it is a cross to you, take it up, and you will find it a blessing."
- 2. "Sing lustily and with a good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength..."
- 3. "Sing modestly. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or distinct from the rest of the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony; but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear melodious sound."
- 4. "Sing in time...Do not run before nor stay behind it."
- 5. "Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing Him more than yourself ...attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve...and reward you..."

In these directions, Wesley gives us good advice for singing and for living! In Advent, there are radio stations playing Christmas music non-stop. There are Advent hymns we save especially for this time of year. There are special choir performances in our communities.

May music be a blessing to you this season. May the music of your heart be a blessing to others as well. Until we sing "Joy to the World the Lord is Come" together on Christmas Eve, Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!



"Kairos"

Advent is all about new time. Mostly when the first century people thought of time and future images it was of last things, end time, with fears and foreboding. The Gospels speak of signs of the end. People expected very little from this world except pain. The future was not friendly. People who lived in fear, cut off from hope, Paul rolls out his Christmas message. If Paul knows of angels and shepherds or wise men from the east, he doesn't go there. Paul will cut to the chase. He will simply say: "When the fullness of time had come (the word for time is *kairos*, meaning a pregnant moment or the right time), God sent a Son, born of woman, born under the law, in order to redeem those captive to the *law--- the old way of looking at life--* so that we might be new adopted children of light. Gal.4: 4

Kairos is a pregnant moment, when something new appeared/appears to us humans. Mostly we live in *chronos* time-the daily ordinary ticking of the clock, empty pages on the calendar. "Another day older and deeper in debt" time—where nothing happens, no one comes. Breaking into that kind of time there was a special moment -- a birth -- and now we know that newness is possible for each of us, even for this old church.


The *kairos* moment is for all who live between those two statements: "there is plenty of time" and "it's too late now." To all who have given in to the old and said nothing new can happen. For all who feel too old, too young, too tired, or too frantic, the God of the second chance has come—the future is open, waiting for you, for me!

In the midst of "Jingle Bell Rock" and "White Christmas," and all the rest, there are special times—*kairos* moments to be seized. Something happens -- the preacher finds new ways to say what needs to be said, it is heard—and the faint-hearted become brave.

Advent is a good time to look for the *kairos* moments. It was December 1 in 1955 when Rosa Parks seized the moment, refused to give up her seat to a white man, and that sparked the 382-day boycott that was the beginning of the end for segregation. That was a *kairos* moment.

We are living in kairos time—God's new time. "You know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far-gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light." Romans 13:11-14.

FINANCIALS

"It is more blessed to give than to receive." - Acts 20:35

December is the season of giving. It is a time filled with family visits, wrapping paper and festive food. With the busyness of the season, giving can become another task on the "to do" list. But for Christians, Christmas giving is more than a tradition; it is the celebration of God's precious gift to us, His Son. God's gift was an act of love. When we give, we echo that love.

As you consider your Christmas giving, please remember the families we will support through Neighbors Inc. with Christmas gifts, our Advent offering that will support Emma Norton and Neighbors Inc. food shelf and gifts that will support the mission of our congregation. Our church has a history of generous giving at this time of year, which each year allows us to meet our annual obligations. We welcome your gifts in the mail, the Sunday offering plate and by use of the QR code in the pews. In addition, you may want to consider some tax-efficient ways to support our church. If you haven't completed your required minimum distribution (RMD), consider using those funds to make a QCD (qualified charitable distribution). You can also donate appreciated stock that has been held for more than a year and avoid capital gains taxes while you may also get a charitable tax deduction for the stock's market value.

Here are a couple of details on how to use these tools:

QCD

- 1. Work with your IRA administrator to send this gift directly from your IRA as a part of our annual RMD.
- 2. The gift is not counted as taxable income, which may lower your overall tax liability.

Donating appreciated stock

- 1. You may transfer a selected appreciated stock (that has appreciated in value and that you have held for more than a year) directly from your brokerage account to the church.
- 2. You can avoid paying long term capital gains tax on the appreciation and you may receive a tax deduction for the stock's market value.

All gifts must be received by the church by 12/31/2025 to be considered a 2025 gift. Start the process early, as it can take time. Contact me for assistance or questions. (Please note that this is not meant to be legal or financial advice. Please work with your financial advisor and/or legal representative.)

As we celebrate the birth of Christ, may our giving be joyful and follow in the spirit of God's gift to us – his Son. Merry Christmas.




